

MR GOVE VISITS COLLINGWOOD

The local MP for Surrey Heath, Mr Michael Gove, visited Collingwood on Friday to listen to GCSE Citizenship students lobby on an issue that they cared about. They gave presentations on a range of issues as part of the Active Citizenship element of their GCSE.

The first group, made up of Lauren Jones, Edith Bentley and Sophie Harkness, lobbied to change the voting age from 18 to 16 years old. They argued that it would encourage good voting habits in the next generation and that their research shows that 16 year olds can be trusted to cast considered votes. Mr Gove was very impressed and responded thoughtfully to the points raised. He gave counter argument that since the average life expectancy is increasing, we should raise all responsibilities to age 18 to compensate for this.

YEAR 8 STUDENTS ATTEND STREET STRONG – STREET SAFE WORKSHOP



Seven Year 8 students were given the privilege to attend a workshop called 'Street Strong -Street Safe' on Thursday 9 March at Guildford's amazing Cathedral.

The workshop was delivered as part of their National Antiaggression campaign, and

included a presentation by Dean Coady. Dean's work is nationally recognised for supporting safer streets and preventing incidents. His presentation and training touched on several areas within our PSHE programme including County Lines and anti-social behaviour.

During part of the tour the students were able to take in the national monument for anti-aggression, The Knife Angel. The Knife Angel's singular objective is to bring about social change by educating children, young people and adults about the harmful effects that violent behaviour has on communities all across our nation.





The sculpture, 27 ft high made from over 100,000 seized blades, was specifically created to highlight the negative effects of violent behaviour whilst solidifying our critical need for social change. Not only does the Angel act as a catalyst for turning the tide on violent and aggressive behaviour, but it also acts as a beautiful memorial designed to celebrate those lives who have been lost through these violent and thoughtless actions.

The exhibition is open to the public every day in March.

EXAM CERTIFICATES

Exam certificate postage payment is available on ParentPay. Please ensure payment is made as soon as possible to ensure your child receives their exam certificates for the Summer 2023 season. This is of particular importance for those students in Years 11 and 13 who are leaving the College. To avoid certificates being lost in transit or left crumpled at the bottom of a school bag, we encourage payment to be made for Years 9 and 10 too.

For those that make payment for postage, exam certificates are usually despatched in December using Royal Mail's 'Signed For' service.

Certificates will be required by future employers and further education institutes. If you don't have your certificates when you need them in later life, the exam boards can provide a replacement statement of results but it is very costly.

ON BEHALF OF SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL: SAFER TRAVEL SCHOOL SURVEY

Collingwood is assisting Surrey County Council's Safer Travel Team to undertake research with parents on students' types of travel to and from school. This follows the huge success that the previous survey had, with over 170 schools taking part in last year's survey.

As a direct result of the previous surveys Surrey County Council has secured an additional £3 million funding to improve measures outside schools to make walking and cycling and scooting to school easier and safer.

The objective of the research is to develop a better understanding of the different types of travel, how frequently they're used and why that type is used. Once the Safer Travel Team has collected and analysed this information provided by parents, its goal is to obtain a better understanding of journeys to school, so it can continue encouraging safer and more active travel to school for all children in Surrey.
